Chairman & Managing Director



In the 31st year of its incorporation, SJVN is proud to have made its mark in growing from a single state operations to not only 6 states of the Indian union but also to two neighbouring countries, it also feels satisfied to have impacted the lives of lakhs of people and brought smiles on their faces through its CSR efforts. Be it the health initiatives, providing medical services at the doorsteps of people through 14 MMUs and specialised health camps, or the education and skill upgradation plans through its scholarships and reward schemes, the company's initiatives have been sustaining through building community assets for bringing about long term benefits to the masses. Today, a number of NGOs and other organisations look towards SJVN for long term association in the field of social welfare and also for financial support to further their mission of reaching out to the masses.

Though the community welfare efforts had been commenced ever since the birth of the organisation, the initiatives were given a formal shape about a decade ago in the true sense. Well before the enactment of the Companies Act, 2013, the company had its budgetary plans for CSR activities in place. However, post the Act, the initiatives were formalised and made more objective. The CSR policy which was already in place was revisited and modified.

As we look back to the year 2012, which also marked the Silver Jubilee Year of the company's formation, we find that the humble beginning of rendering health care services through 6 Mobile Medical Units under the name "Satluj Sanjeevani Sewa" has now expanded to 4 states with a total 14 units catering to the needs of people in far flung and remote areas at their door steps. It is a matter of satisfaction that the number of treatments provided by these MMUs has crossed 5 Lakh already. And what is more satisfying is that the women beneficiaries outnumber their male counterparts. Similarly, the success of health camps too is laudable since their




number has already crossed 200 providing treatments to more than 60,000 beneficiaries.

I am happy to note that the SJVN Foundation which was formed in the year 2011 has been implementing the laid down CSR initiatives most effectively and in a transparent manner. In terms of the Companies Act, 2013, the Trust has since been engaged in a number of activities under six major verticals. Every year, a budget close to Rs. 35 crore is given at the disposal of the Foundation to further its ongoing and new missions. The trust has since handled a total budget of over Rs. 170 crore with an objective to bring positive impact on the lives of outreach people of the society.

Keeping in view the needs of the people, SJVN Foundation has addressed the areas of concern under various segments. However, as it comes to providing and building assets for the community, the Foundation acts in due consultations with the Village Area Development Committees (VADCs). The largest share of the expenditure, I find, is incurred on sustainable development followed by infrastructural development and then education and skill development. It is a matter of great pride that the number of people benefiting from the various CSR schemes have increased manifold. All the activities are however undertaken within the given guidelines of the Company's Act.

Towards achieving the endeavour, SJVN has thus already embarked upon a journey of social change through inclusive growth. Its efforts have long been strategic and focussed.

EDITOR SPEAK



*W*hen we talk of CSR practices being followed by various Public Sector Undertakings, we find that the SJVN Foundation has not only made its mark but also established benchmarks in the industry. Be it in the field of providing medical services, or promoting education and skill development, or creating assets for the community, SJVN has never lagged behind in coming to the help of needy. If we look back to the year 2012 when mobile medical units had been launched by SJVN, we find that we have come a long way from a humble beginning of 6 MMUs to 14 MMUs today. It is heartening to find that these MMUs have cumulatively provided more than 5 lakh treatments ever since. It is all the more satisfying that the service has extensively benefitted womenfolk who have long been neglecting their own healthcare in the face of attending to their unending domestic chores.

The figures show that the number of women beneficiaries have outnumbered males. Similarly, the service has come as a boon to old and physically challenged people who could hardly afford to move out to the distant medical centres. There are many bedridden patients too who were diagnosed for certain deficiencies and cured with regular doses of vitamins and minerals by the MMU doctors. It is heartening to find that people in villages on route of these MMUs look forward to the days of their visits while in emergencies they can also reach the medical services being provided by the company at its own hospitals.

Beyond the medical services being offered at their door steps, the initiatives of SJVN in funding the integrated Muscular Dystrophy Centre at Solan have been highly lauded. In the recent programme of the Centre, Hon'ble Governor of HP felicitated SJVN for extending financial support to the tune of Rs 456 lakh. In addition to this centre, SJVN has also funded many other institutions engaged in providing health care service to the people.

When it comes to empowering the youth, the focus of SJVN continued on benefiting the youth with a host of Skill upgradation and training programs. While 117 youths were sponsored to Government ITIs, more than 1600 farmers were



provided short term Skill development training at the two Agricultural Universities of Himachal. The company has also undertaken to fund six ITIs of the state to become "Centres of Excellence" SJVN had earlier also taken up funding two other ITIs in Himachal Pradesh for upgradation.

In the area of promoting education, under the company's ongoing Silver jubilee Merit Scholarship Scheme, 250 meritorious students from five states were awarded scholarships of Rs. 2000 per month each till completion of their respective courses, taking the number of total beneficiaries to 1137 since 2012. It is heartening that the scheme is paying off well as 51 of the scholarship beneficiaries have already got employment and are drawing salary in the range of Rs. 5 lakh per annum. A large number of these students are also pursuing post graduate courses like MBA, M Com, LLM etc. In addition to the Silver Jubilee Merit Scholarship Scheme, the company is also operating a reward scheme for topper students of the Government schools.

A major asset being funded by the company is for construction of a school-cum-home for visually challenged and speech and hearing impaired children at Dhalli. SJVN is providing a financial support of Rs. 827.99 Lakhs for this building. We are also happy to be associated with this institution for funding vocational courses for the students as well as providing them aids and assistive devices.

The company's sustainable development goals aim at creating conditions for inclusive and sustained economic growth, shared prosperity and decent work opportunities for the people living in the vicinity of its projects.

SJVN Foundation aims at continuing with the ongoing activities in the years to come as well as include many other areas for the benefit of masses in its efforts to reach out to the needy.

CSR - An agent of social change in India

The term Corporate Social Responsibility, as it is referred today, has a long history and is indeed a refined and more institutionalized version of charity and philanthropy that existed in history since times immemorial. In the historical perspective, culture, religion, family values and tradition played a key role in doling out freebies to the needy and poor. It derived its essence from the religious scriptures which inherently insisted on a human being sharing a part of his earnings for the needy directly or through the temples which used to carry out community development activities for the masses.

The rich businessmen setting up temples, inns, wells, ponds, schools, hospitals, etc. was a common practice. That is how even today we come across many a temples and hospitals and schools named after renowned business families. Religiously it was considered an act of karma for the benefit of the soul. It was also an effort towards securing an integral position in the society. With the pace of time, the philanthropy made out by the industrialists came to be linked to winning favours of the masses for their business and political interests.

During the independence movement, Mahatma Gandhi introduced the notion of "trusteeship", according to

which the industry leaders had to manage their wealth so as to benefit the common man. He said "I desire to end capitalism almost, if not quite, as much as the most advanced socialist. But our methods differ. My theory of trusteeship is no make-shift, certainly no camouflage. I am confident that it will survive all other theories." Such initiatives propagated the concept of "trusteeship". This only influenced businesses to establish trusts for promoting educational institutions, research centres, hospitals and other community welfare activities.

The emergence of Public Sector Undertakings (PSUs) further promoted the mission of bringing about a social change through a more structured and effective approach. The public sector thus came to be seen as the prime mover of development.

Present status of CSR

Thus we find that CSR is not a new concept in India. Ever since their inception, a number of corporates have remained involved in serving the community through donations and charity activities. In the present context, the basic objective of CSR is related to maximizing the company's overall impact on the society and stakeholders. CSR policies, practices and programs are thus widely integrated with their business operations and processes. The corporate have come to realise that CSR is not just another form of indirect expense but is a means to protecting the goodwill and reputation. Their programs are determined by their corporate vision, their social philosophy and are aligned with their mainstream business.

Providing health and hygiene facilities, building schools and community assets, empowering the society by making them more self-reliant, by providing vocational training are some of the common activities being pursued by the PSUs. Some corporates also join hands

with non-governmental organizations (NGOs) and use their expertise in devising programs which address wider social problems. Their basic objectives are to bring about a significant difference in the society and improve the overall quality of life.

Incorporated in the year 1988, SJVN as a Central PSU under the Ministry of Power is governed by the guidelines of the Department of Public Enterprises issued from time to time. During the past three decades as SJVN has grown to become a multi project company with operations spread out not only in five states of Indian union but across the national boundaries in two neighbouring countries, so have its vision of social responsibility grown into multiple activities be it the field of education, or health care or community development or sustainable growth and rising to the cause of national disasters and protecting the cultural heritage of the country. Much before the enactment of government guidelines to the companies in respect of taking care of the communities as well as the stakeholders, SJVN had set out on a journey of paying back to the communities whom it owed its very inception, existence and growth. Indeed, SJVN is driven and overwhelmed by the cooperation and support of the local communities who extended their all-out support to the company's operations in the face of all the odds. And that is how began the journey of sharing fruits of growth with the locals as well as caring for their wellbeing.

The company had identified and evolved a strong presence by institutionalising its activities and also establishing a dedicated SJVN Foundation way back in 2011. Post the rules and regulations enacted under the Companies Act, 2013 governing the CSR practices, the company's line of action was realigned with the new legislation and guidelines of the government. With objectives remaining the same, the areas of focus are

now well defined and so is the CSR policy of the company. SJVN has formulated and adopted a well perceived CSR and Sustainability Policy which is in consonance with the Companies Act, 2013.

In accordance with Companies Act, 2013, Companies (Corporate Social Responsibility Policy) Rules, 2014 ('the Rules') and DPE guidelines on CSR applicable w.e.f. 2014, SJVN has constituted a committee of Directors on CSR and also modified its CSR policy accordingly. As per the Act and the guidelines set out, SJVN has made a provision of allocating 2% of the average net profits made during the three immediate preceding financial years for CSR activities.

Towards achieving this endeavour, SJVN has already embarked upon a journey of social change through inclusive growth. Its efforts have long been strategic and focussed.

CSR Committee

The convention at SJVN Foundation is that the Committee of Directors is headed by an Independent Director that allows the monitoring process to be a transparent one and ensures that the CSR funds are utilized with due diligence.

The role of CSR committee encompasses drawing up the CSR budget, annual plan, formulating the CSR policy and monitoring of CSR activities. In such a framework CSR always does get due attention from the organizations apex body, which ensures that the CSR policies and programs being pursued are in tune with the spirit behind CSR legislation.



Together the Committee of Directors and Board of Directors (COD/BOD) steer the CSR journey of the organization and decide the direction in which CSR journey must move forward.

The Committee of Directors on CSR has been constituted in 198th BOD meeting. The latest reconstitution has been done in 243rd BOD meeting. The details of members as on 31-3-2018 are as follows:

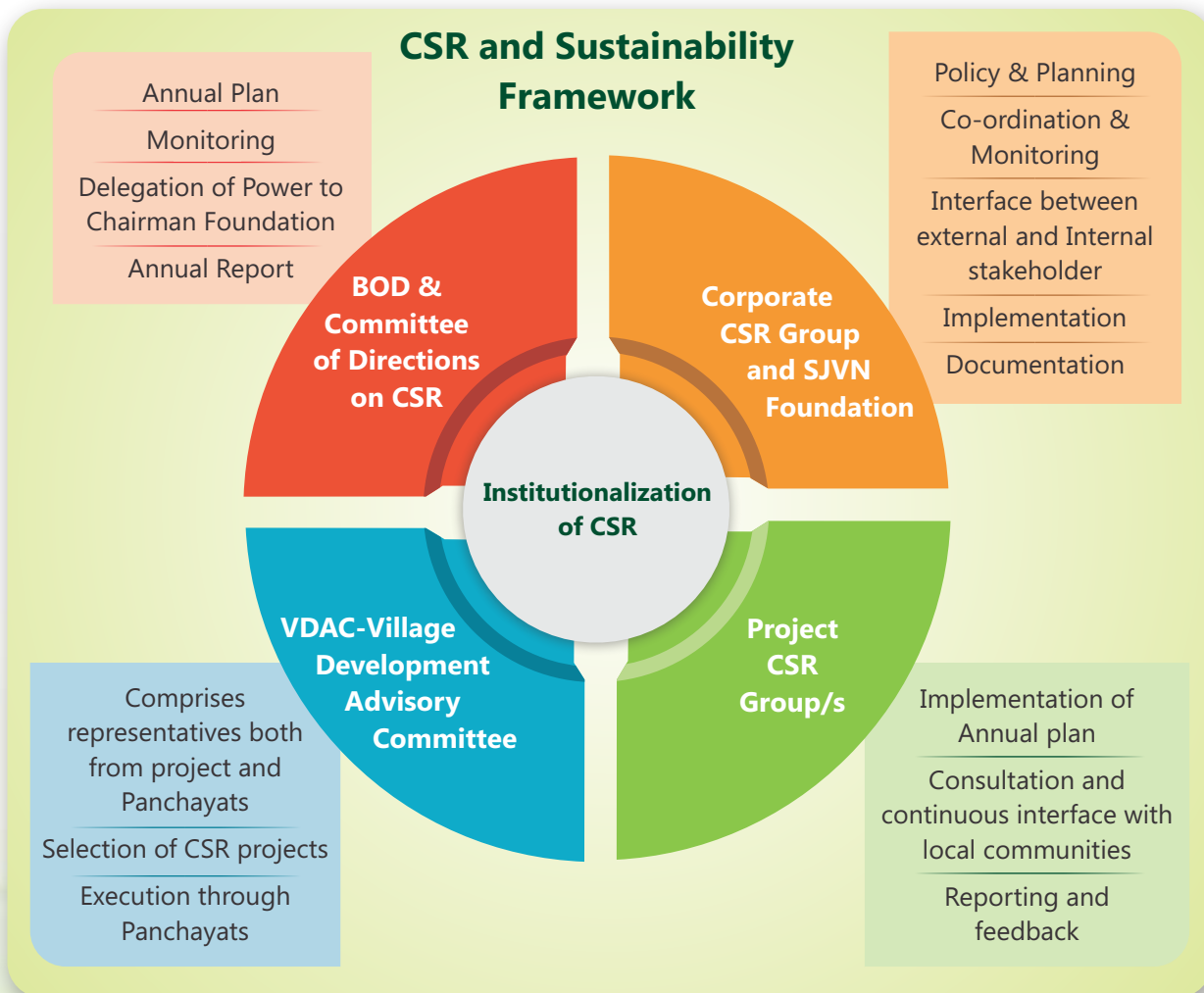

SJVN CSR and Sustainability Policy

The Corporate Social Responsibility and Community Development Policy of SJVN, based on the CSR guidelines issued by Department of Public Enterprises, Government of India, 2010 was approved by the BOD at its 208th meeting held on 30-11-2011. Now as per the Companies Act, 2013, the CSR policy has been revised and was approved by BOD at its 232nd meeting held on 07-11-2014.

SJVN Foundation is an implementing arm of SJVN for carrying out CSR activities and believes in philosophy that 'Goodness is the only investment that never fails'



3 CSR Verticals and Annual Plan

Based upon the Schedule VII of Companies Act, 2013 and the national agenda, CSR priorities at SJVN are undertaken under the following six verticals:



Health and hygiene



Education and Skill Development



Infrastructure and Community Development



Sustainable Development



Promotion and preservation of local culture, heritage and sports



Assistance to the victims of Natural Disasters/ Calamities

These six verticals are the broad heads which encompass all the activities mentioned in schedule VII of the Companies Act, 2013.

CSR and Sustainability Budget FY 2017-18

As per Companies Act, 2013 SJVN is required to allocate 2% of the average net profits made during the three preceding financial years. Annual 2% of the average net profit of SJVN during last three years is Rs. 37.50 Cr.

SJVN has adopted a pragmatic approach in finalizing the annual CSR plan where the participation of all

internal as well as external stakeholders is ensured at all levels. The process of preparation of a budget plan for the ensuing year starts in the month of December. Project heads are consulted and their inputs are considered. At the projects level, the needs, aspirations and suggestions of external stakeholders at the local level are taken into consideration before raising a demand for budget allocation to the corporate office.



In turn the CSR budget is prepared at the corporate level and submitted to the Committee of Directors. After incorporating the recommendations of the Committee of Directors, the Board of Directors is competent to approve the budget. The whole process takes over 2 months and by March the annual plan and budget for the next year is finalized.

After completion of the financial year, expenditure against the allocated heads are finalized and presented in the Directors Annual Report, duly signed by Chairman SJVN Foundation and Chairman Committee of Directors on CSR. The details are as follows:

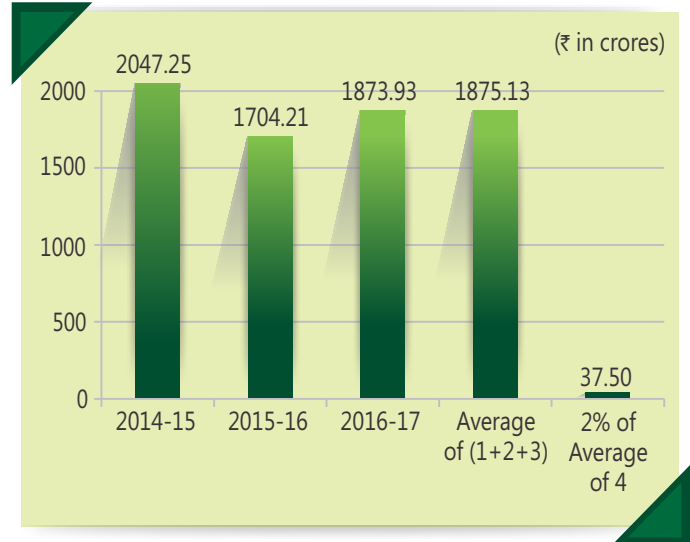
Average Net Profit of the Company for the last three financial years

Glimpses of Major CSR & Sustainability Initiatives 2017-18

4.1 Health and Hygiene

Way back in 1995, when SJVN's 1500 MW Nathpa Jhakri Hydro Power Project was under construction, the company had provided a financial support of Rs.8 crore to the Himachal Pradesh government for construction of a Hospital at Rampur Bushahar to meet the health care needs of the people of project areas. Today thousands of people from hundreds of villages in Shimla, Kinnaur and Kullu district reach this hospital for treatment. This is one of the examples of our service to the people living not only in the project affected areas but elsewhere in the state.

Moving further, difficulties of people of hilly terrains, the elderly, poor local medical facilities, financial constraints etc. were empathetically considered and the company went extra mile in reaching out to such outreach persons through its various health interventions. Progress in respect of the major interventions taken by SJVN Foundation is detailed hereunder:

Satluj Sanjeevani Sewa

As a step towards taking health care to the door steps of the beneficiaries, SJVN had launched the Satluj Sanjeevani Sewa on the occasion of company's Silver Jubilee in the year 2012. The free health consultancy and medicines to the rural people residing in the project areas in the states of Himachal Pradesh, Uttarakhand, Bihar and Maharashtra are being provided under the

umbrella of project "Satluj Sanjeevani Sewa" through 12 Mobile Medical Units (MMUs). The project is being implemented through HelpAge India. All these MMUs are equipped with qualified medical staff (MBBS doctors, pharmacists, social protection officers) and basic diagnostic test equipment.



During the year, 1,43,707 treatments were provided to the beneficiaries in four states of the company's operations namely Himachal Pradesh, Uttarakhand, Bihar and Maharashtra. Cumulatively 5,18,571 treatments have already been provided during six years of the operations of MMUs. It is matter of satisfaction that the women beneficiaries have outnumbered men as normally it is seen that the women folk tend to neglect their health. Details of cumulative treatments provided through the 12 MMUs till 31st March, 2018 is as below:

Health camps through Help Age India

Further to the health care service at the door steps of villagers through the 14 Mobile Medical Units under Satluj Sanjeevani Sewa, the company realised that the regular visits of the MMUs provided treatments for normal ailments while for critical problems, the patients still needed to visit hospitals located at far-off places from their homes. This prompted SJVN to provide specialised medical services to the patients through Health Camps. The objective of organising health camps was to provide specialised medical services in the areas of gynaecology, ophthalmology,

56 year old Sharda Devi from VPO Nirath District Shimla H.P. was under Treatment for Asthma. After the death of her husband many years ago she had been living with her brother who is a small shop keeper in the village. Sharda Devi is a deaf and mute person. Her disabilities have made her completely dependent on her brother. Sharda Devi first came to the visiting MMU in July 2014. She had been informed of the free medical services being provided by SJVN by one of her relatives, who too was under treatment at the MMU. Upon examination, the medical consultant found that Sharda Devi was Asthmatic for over 10 years. Through sign language she communicated to the team, that she had been feeling very uncomfortable for many years, especially during winter. She had previously visited a government hospital for treatment, however it was of little help. Sharda Devi continues to be under treatment and she visits the site every 15 days. With the treatment given her symptoms have subsided and is much more comfortable than before.

orthopaedics, etc. which also included various medical tests. For the FY 2017-18, a MoU was entered between SJVN and HelpAge India for conducting health camps during FY 2017-18.

35 camps were organized during FY 2017-18. In the health camps a total 13,424 patients were treated and the beneficiaries included 7,464 women. Dental clinic services at Rampur Project hospital

Dental treatment is not available in the areas close to the Rampur Project where a full-fledged hospital is already providing health services to the needy. In order to provide this specialised service, a dental clinic is being run at the Project hospital which is also open to the local public of project affected areas. During the year, 1033 patients were benefitted through this clinic facility.



Sample collection services through SRL at RHPS

The Rampur Project hospital is also providing the services of diagnostic check-up of samples through SRL. During the year, 220 patients were benefitted through this sample collection service.

Physiotherapy services at Rampur HPS

Physiotherapy services especially required for the age related problems and for accident related problems were not available to the villagers around the Rampur Project. In order to cater to this



need, a Physiotherapy Centre was opened at the Project Hospital at Bayal. During the year as many as 902 patients were benefitted.



SJVN empowering women of weaker section

Under SJVN's Women and Child Development scheme launched in the year 2012, financial assistance of Rs 10,000 each is being provided during ante natal and post-natal period for proper nourishment to each expected mother falling under the BPL category in project areas. During both the consultations gift packs worth Rs. 1000 comprising nutritional food, baby soaps, and other hygienic items etc. are also given to each BPL women.



During the FY 2017-18, total 178 BPL women have benefitted under this scheme while a total 517 women have been benefitted since commencement of the scheme. The project wise details of beneficiaries are as follows:

Augmentation of Medical Equipment and Instruments

Vivekanand Medical Institute (a Unit of Vivekanand Medical Research Trust), Palampur, Distt.-Kangra, Himachal Pradesh had made a proposal for provision of financial assistance for augmentation of medical equipment and other instruments to SJVN.

The proposal of VMI amounting to Rs. 92,10,475 which included Rs. 52,10,475 for instruments for general diagnosis and Rs. 40,00,000 for surgical instruments was deliberated and approved by the Foundation.

The utilization certificates of all four instalments have been received from VMI through a duly constituted committee.

Financial support for construction of Rotary Ashray near IGM Cancer Hospital

The SJVN Foundation considered a proposal of Shimla Rotary Charitable Trust for construction of a Cancer Sarai near IGM Cancer Hospital to facilitate the cancer patients and their attendants. She believes that since Muscular Dystrophy centre, one of its kind in entire country, came to Solan with the help of SJVN Limited, so she along with other patients of muscular dystrophy are finding new hope through this centre. Now two floors have become fully functional, the centre has already started serving patients in more systematic and organized manner with state of the art facilities available there. She firmly believes that this centre is going to be boon for the patients of muscular dystrophy as new research and facilities are going to change the scenario in positive manner. She thanked SJVN and IAMD for this noble cause.

Corporation, Shimla. The estimated cost of the project is Rs. 3.85 crore. The Rotary Trust had requested SJVN Foundation for providing financial support of Rs. 1.0 crore for supporting this cause. The Foundation Trust

deliberated the committee's report for extending financial support to Shimla Rotary Charitable Trust for construction of Rotary Ashray near IGMC Cancer Hospital and accorded in principle approval for the financial support for construction of one floor (Preferably 3rd floor for Sarai) in the proposed/ under construction building besides naming the floor as SJVN floor.

As per the estimate of the Rotary Club, an amount of Rs. 74,16,600 was approved by the Foundation and a consent letter issued to Rotary Charitable Trust.

Financial support for purchase of Mobile Medical Van

SJVN Foundation is extending financial support to Dr. Hedgewar Samarak Samiti working in social sector to provide social services like organizing blood donation camps, free medical camps and providing education to the children of weaker sections of societies. The approved amount includes the capital cost for purchase of vehicle, medical equipment, fabrication cost, running and maintenance cost for two years.

SJVN's efforts thus complement the mandate of National Rural Health Mission of India towards improving the lagging health indicators among rural population and outreached people.

65 years old Kausalya Devi from Dharmagatpur, Buxar has been under treatment for T2 DM Epileptic Attack with Hypertension. She was under a great deal of stress during her first visit to our MMU site in December, 2014. She was under treatment for epileptic attacks from a private practitioner, with very little relief. The regular follow ups, free consultancy and medicines provided by the SJVN's MMU have improved her health. Her treatment continues and her family members are satisfied with the services being provided and praise the team for giving the village access to quality medical treatment at their doorstep.



4.2 Education and Skill Development

SJVN believes in empowering the people as it believes that an empowered and educated society is the greatest asset it can build. The efforts include not only extending financial assistance to the meritorious students by way of awards and scholarships but also strengthening the educational institutes of the area in a big way. The company finds that developing technical skills of the youth would be more effective to improve their employability in their own business or in employment.



SJVN feels that a Society with diverse socio economic background needs support like this. Human Capital with population base like India is going to give back dividend if they are educated and given right opportunities of learning and development. Going by this philosophy and also as futuristic approach, the company strongly supports the initiatives on investing in future generations of people living in vicinity of its Projects.

ITIs sponsorship for project youth

SJVN sponsors students from project areas to Government ITIs. Besides the course fees, the students are also given a stipend of Rs. 2000/- per month. During

NJHPS: The IMC has been constituted. As per MOU, IMC has developed IDP with total outlay of Rs. 1 crore.

RHPS: The IDP for Financial year 2017-18 has been received from both the ITI's Nirmand and Dalash and the same has been approved in 2nd IMC Meeting held on 4.08.2017. Accordingly ITI Nirmand has spent Rs.35,46,822 and ITI Dalash has spent amounting to Rs. 26,12,998 till date. Total amount spent by both ITI's up to 31st March 2018 is Rs. 61, 59,820.

LHEP: An amount of Rs. 53.50 Lakh has been spent by ITI Kumarsain whereas no amount has been spent by ITI Nanidhar as per IDP against which payment was released. As regard to ITI Khadahan it has been informed by LHEP that the IMC has been constituted and as per the MoU, IMC has developed the IDP.

Strengthening and augmentation of ITIs at Berthin, and Bengana

I. The Funds of Rs.1 crore each provided by SJVN to the ITI Berthin and ITI Bangana have been utilized by the ITIs and the utilisation certificates too have been submitted by the respective ITIs.

However, ITI Bangana has available funds more than Rs. 2.00 crore provided by Government of India as

interest free loan. Similarly ITI, Berthin has available funds of more than Rs. 4.00 crore out of Rs. 3.00 crore provided by the Government of Himachal Pradesh and Rs. 2.5 crore provided by the Government of India as interest free loan.

- II. The initial IMCs were constituted in the year 2009 for a period of three years having Executive Director, SJVN as Chairman and a few other SJVN officials as members. Similarly the IMC was re-constituted in the year 2012 with the Notification dated 1.03.2012 of Principal Secretary (T.E), GOHP for a period of three year having CMD, SJVN as Chairman and a few other SJVN officials as members.
- III. After Completion of the tenure of above IMCs, further development of the ITIs was governed by the Governing Council comprising of the Chairman and other members taken from GOHP only.
- IV. Now Director (T.E), GOHP vide his letter dated 15.11.2017 addressed to the all Principals of ITIs in HP has invited proposals for reconstitution of IMCs.

SJVN Silver Jubilee Merit Scholarship Scheme

The SJVN Silver Jubilee Merit Scholarship Scheme which aims at inculcating competitive spirit among school students was launched in the FY 2012-13. The scheme is open to 12th class meritorious students for pursuing higher studies in different streams. Selected students are paid a scholarship of Rs. 2,000 per month till completion of their respective courses. The merit scholarship is awarded to students passing out the State Board, CBSE and ISC examinations from 5 states namely



Himachal Pradesh, Uttarakhand, Bihar, Maharashtra and Arunachal Pradesh.

HIMCON had been engaged for the implementation of SJVN Silver Jubilee Merit Scholarship Scheme in the year 2017. After receipt of applications and scrutiny, 250 students were shortlisted for receiving of the scholarships in the five states.

Naval Kishore belongs to a poor family. His father is a farmer and the earnings of the family were meagre. Due to poor economic condition, Naval Kishore could take education only upto tenth class. He was looking for an opportunity where he could get some employable skill so that he can support his family. In the month of December 2013, he got to know that SJVN is conducting free skill development training programme through HIMCON in the trade of 'Mobile Repair' and that proved to be a turning point in his life as he got himself enrolled for the program. After the completion of the program he opened his mobile repair shop in the name of Joshi Communication & Mobile Repair Kulsari, Tehsil Tharali, District Chamoli. Now he is a happy entrepreneur earning more than Rs. 15,000/- per month and living his life with dignity.



Encouraging talent

Financial support to Prayas Society, Hamirpur for "VOICE" centres

Paryas is an NGO engaged in providing basic computer skills to local people to make them computer literate. For setting up of a project called VOICE (Vivekanand Organisation for Information, Communication & Empowerment) centres in District Hamirpur, Himachal Pradesh the NGO had requested for a financial support of Rs 1,36,10,000. This amount included construction of building, furniture & operational expenditure annually.

The Trust deliberated the proposal for providing financial assistance to Paryas Society for running the computer training program in rented premises under the banner VOICE and decided the following:

1. To release the financial assistance of Rs. 3,73,536 for furnishing the training hall.
2. To release the financial assistance of Rs. 11,80,154 for procurement of computer appliances.
3. To release the financial assistance of Rs. 3,57,000 for engagement of faculty for training on commencement of training initially for a period of three months.

Consequent upon the approval for releasing the funds of Rs. 19,10,690/- the Prayas Society has submitted the work order for furnishing of training hall and supply order for computer, appliances and furniture for Rs. 15,53,708.

Further 50% of the awarded amount i.e. 7,76,845 was released to "Prayas Society on 31/03/2017 against sr. no. 1 & 2 mentioned above during FY 2016-17.



Financial support for construction of Dudhiya Baba Kanya Chatrawas

Shri Dudhiya Baba Sanyas Ashram Rudrapur (being run and managed under the supervision of Sewa Prakalp Sansthan) had requested SJVN Foundation for providing a grant of Rs. 1.85 crore in multi phases for construction of the hostel building. The construction of hostel building aims to accommodate 180 girls. The proposal was deliberated and the Trust got the proposal examined by Dehradun office which recommended that SJVN Foundation may provide financial assistance for construction of first floor of the chatrawas. The committee recommended releasing the financial support of Rs. 1.85 crore in six instalments. The first phase construction cost was Rs. 61.77 lakh out of which the first part cost amounted to Rs. 39.23 lakh and the second part cost was Rs. 22.54 lakh. Based on recommendations of the committee, the first and second part funds amounting to Rs. 30 Lakh and Rs 31.77 Lakh respectively have been released.

SJVN strongly believes that these initiatives would also support the Government's endeavour in empowering youth, improving employability and creating a productive work environment.



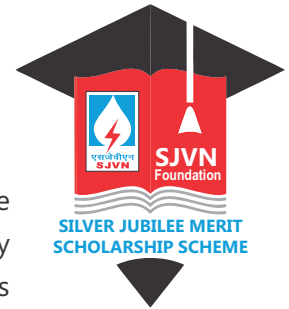


51 Beneficiaries of Silver Jubilee Merit Scholarship Scheme are now Gainfully Employed

It is heartening that 51 (21+30) recipients of the 2012 and 2013 batches of SJVN Silver Jubilee Merit Scholarship Scheme launched in 2012, are today gainfully employed and receiving pay packages ranging from Rs. 2.5 lac to more than Rs.5 lac per annum. Of the other, 216 (104+112) students are pursuing higher studies in the fields of C.A., MBA, MSc, M.Com, M.A., LLM etc at various premier institutions. In the 2012 batch 147 students had been selected for award of scholarships which included 69 girl students while in the 2013 batch 150 students had been selected which included 61 girls. In the subsequent years, the number of scholarships were increased to 250 every year in order to add more beneficiaries from BPL and PWD categories of students. During the first six years of its operations (2012-2017), 1137 students have already been covered under the scholarship scheme.

The SJVN Silver Jubilee Merit Scholarship Scheme had been launched on the occasion of company's Silver

Jubilee in the year 2012 with the objective to provide monetary assistance to meritorious students of Himachal Pradesh and Uttarakhand to pursue higher education. The scheme was later expanded to include students from other states of SJVN's operations like Bihar, Maharashtra and Arunachal Pradesh. The scheme is open to 12th class meritorious students for pursuing higher studies in the streams of their choice. Selected students are paid a scholarship of Rs. 2,000 per month till the time they complete their respective courses of study. The merit scholarship is awarded to students passing out the State Board or CBSE or ISC examinations from the 5 states of SJVN's operations. Every year 250 students are awarded scholarship under the scheme. The beneficiaries included students from SC, ST, BPL, PWD and minority communities as well.

4.3 Infrastructural Development and Community Assets Creation

Over the years, SJVN has built and shaped thousands of infrastructures like, school buildings, hospitals, bus stands, mahila mandals, panchayat ghars, public toilets, link roads, public parks, play grounds etc. with active involvement of Gram Panchayats and local communities. Every year hundreds of such assets are created for the benefit of the people. To formalize such activities, Village Development Area Committees (VDACs) have been formed, which help in bringing transparency, objectivity and sense of ownership.

Execution of such projects are done through these VDACs, local contractors and school management committees.

Construction of community assets in project areas

During the FY 2017-18, as many as 109 community assets were taken up for construction in the project areas as per details. Out of this, 67 assets have already been completed while the other works are different stages of completion.



- 109 community assets being developed in project areas in Himachal, Uttarakhand, Bihar and Arunachal Pradesh during FY 2017-18.
- Rs. 3,16,88,763 spent on creation of community assets through Municipal Corporation, Shimla.
 - Rs.15.75 lakh being given for construction works and maintenance of crematorium at Annandale, Shimla.
 - Rs. 2.57 Lakh given for construction of two additional cremation beds and fibre glass protection to the statue of Lord Shiva at Kanlog cremation ground.
 - Rs. 2,08,52,094 given for metalling and tarring of 3.64 Km road from village Bayal (batching plant) to village Koyal, near Rampur HPS.
- Rs.5,67,000 Financial support for construction of three crematoriums in Gram Panchayat Pagog.

Further, for the development of Rani Ground at Kasumpti, as mentioned in the above table, MC, Shimla had conveyed that due to some variation in original estimate, the same had been revised to Rs. 1,50,53,399 (i.e. Rs. 43,07,453 in excess of awarded amount) and approved by Hon'ble M.C. House.



The Trust was apprised about the revised cost of the project from earlier awarded amount for Rs. 1,07,45,946 to Rs. 1,50,53,399 and the Trust after examining the revised cost estimate, approval it. Accordingly an amount of Rs. 50 lakh has been released to MC, Shimla.

Construction and maintenance of crematorium at Annandale, Shimla

Shamshan Ghat Welfare Society, Annadale, Shimla had requested for providing financial contribution of Rs. 15.75 Lakh for construction and maintenance of crematorium at Anandale. The first instalment of Rs. 3.93 Lakh was released to the Society during FY 2016-17. After the Society submitting the utilization certificate of the first instalment the payment for 2nd instalment amounting to Rs. 7.87 has also been released to the society.

Financial assistance for augmentation works at cremation ground, Kanlog

Sood Sabha, Shimla had requested for financial contribution of Rs. 2.57 Lakh for construction of two additional cremation beds and fibre glass protection to the statue of Lord Shiva at Kanlog. Accordingly, an amount of Rs. 2.26 Lakh was released to the Sood Sabha against which utilization certificate has been received.

Further, another request was received for providing 2nd

phase financial support amounting to Rs. 1,94,102 for restoration and improvement of crematorium at Kanlog against which the first installment amounting to Rs. 97,051 too has been released to the society.



Metalling and tarring of road to village Koyal in project affected area of RHPS

For the metalling and tarring of 3.64 kms road from Bayal (batching plant) to village Koyal, an additional budget of Rs. 2,08,52,094 had been recommended under CSR. The same has been approved by SJVN and the Foundation.

Accordingly, a consent letter was sent by Rampur HPS to Executive Engineer, outer Seraj Division, HPPWD, Nirmand, Distt. Kullu (HP). Further, 70% of the project cost amounting to Rs. 1,45,96,464 has been released to the HPPWD.

Financial support for construction of crematoriums in Pagog

Gram Panchayat Pagog, Tehsil & Distt. Shimla had requested SJVN for financial support for construction of three crematoriums in their Gram Panchayat area. The Panchayat had also enclosed an estimate amounting to Rs. 5,67,000 (@ Rs. 1,89,000 per crematorium) The Foundation decided to extend financial support of the desired amount of Rs. 5,67,000 for construction of three crematoriums. Accordingly, 1st installment amounting to Rs. 1,12,552 has been released to the society.



Financial support for construction of school buildings

Himachal Shiksha Samiti, Saraswati Vidya Mandir, Vikasnager, Shimla had requested SJVN for financial support for the construction of buildings for eight Saraswati Vidya Mandir schools located in Himachal Pradesh.

It was decided by the Foundation that initially financial support can be extended on pilot basis to Saraswati Vidya Mandir, Him Rashmi Parisar, Vikasnagar, and



Shimla on the recommendations of a nominated committee. The committee recommended consideration of the proposal to provide a financial support of Rs. 2,33,90,071 to the Samiti. Accordingly, a communication was issued to Himachal Shiksha Samiti consenting extension of a financial support of Rs. 2,33,90,071 for finishing and site development works of newly constructed hostel building of Saraswati Vidya Mandir, Shimla. As per request of the Samiti, 1st instalment amounting to Rs. 86,72,064 has also been released.

Construction of School-cum-Home for special children at Dhalli

SJVN is providing a financial support of Rs. 827.99 Lakhs for construction of School-cum-home for visually challenged and speech and hearing impaired children at Dhalli over a period of three years.

Accordingly, an MoU was signed with Dy. Director, SC, OBC & Minority Affairs, Govt. of Himachal Pradesh on 21/03/2017.

HP Govt. informed that since this project will be implemented through HP PWD as a deposit work, therefore, the total funds are required to be transferred to the Directorate SC, OBCs & Minority Affairs. Accordingly, an amount of Rs. 5.18 Crore had been released to Director SC, OBC & Minority Affairs, Shimla.

Later, during a meeting held on 06.12.17, Directorate SC, OBCs & Minority Affairs informed that the award of the work was likely to be issued soon and as per the latest status received through letter, the work has not yet been awarded by HPPWD.

In addition, for the holistic development of the children SJVN has also provided assisting devices and aids through Artificial Limbs Corporation of India Limited (ALIMCO) to 24 children at a cost of Rs. 2,73,360/-.



Besides the material support, SJVN is also actively involved in their overall development by organizing games and picnics with groups of its employees and their family members. The school has also been provided furniture and fixtures for their dining hall as well as utensils for their kitchen by the Company. The Foundation is also providing financial support of Rs.11.01 lakh a year to the Himachal Pradesh Bal Kalyan Parishad directly for engaging teachers and professional staff for running the vocational training programmes in the school with the objective of improving the quality of education and augmenting the vocational skills of the students.



Financial support for furnishing of “Research and Rehabilitation centre” for Differently abled at Bilaspur

Chetna, an NGO of Bilaspur had requested SJVN for providing financial support of Rs. 1.08 crore for furnishing of ground floor of Research and Rehabilitation centre for differently abled and deprived sections of society at Village Vijaypur, Pargana, Gehrwin, Tehsil Jhanduta, Distt Bilaspur (H.P).



It is relevant to mention here that SJVN had earlier also provided an amount of Rs. 25 Lakh for structure work of ground floor of the Centre during FY 2015-16. To examine the request, a committee of Dhaulasidh HEP had been constituted.

Based on the report and recommendations of the committee, an amount of Rs. 20 Lakh was approved and the same has been released to Chetna. The same committee is to monitor the utilization of the work of “Research and Rehabilitation centre”

With need based support in the form of resources, infrastructure, amenities and financial assistance, SJVN has been supporting the society in a big way. SJVN feels pride in partnering such initiatives and building social infrastructure of the Nation.

4.4 Sustainable Development

SJVN has been undertaking various initiatives in the field of environmental sustainability. It is not only in building and providing infrastructure for the welfare of local communities, but also in creating assets which can be taken over by the users and sustained by themselves, is what SJVN promotes. The company's sustainable development goals aim at creating conditions for inclusive and sustained economic growth, shared prosperity and decent work opportunities for the people living in the vicinity of its projects.

Infrastructure to secure water needs- Rehabilitation of water bodies

Natural sources of water are the only source of water supply in the remote villages in mountainous regions. The spring water if not tapped and stored keeps flowing down the hill. SJVN over the years came forward to help the villagers in the vicinity of its projects and operations in rebuilding these water sources and also providing storage facilities by building tanks. During the FY 2017-18, 26 water bodies have been/are being rehabilitated as per detail below.

Swachh Vidyalaya Abhiyan

SJVN has been an active partner of Swachh Bharat Abhiyan and draws its inspiration from the thoughts of Father of Nation, Mahatma Gandhi that "Sanitation is more important than Independence". The company has taken a host of initiatives to promote the cause of Open Defecation Free India in line with the schemes of the central and state governments.



a. Status of toilets transferred to HP State Govt. for Construction

In recognition to the historical announcement made by our Hon'ble Prime Minister on 2nd October, 2014 that all schools in the country should have toilet blocks with separate toilets for girls by 2nd October, 2015, SJVN had come forward to construct as many as 2421 toilets which included 1199 toilets for boys and 1222 toilets for girls thus surpassing the targets of 2271 toilets assigned by the union Ministry of Power.

In addition to the above, SJVN is also funding construction of 178 toilets under Sarva Shiksha Abhiyan of the government of Himachal Pradesh at a total cost of Rs.133.50 Lakh. Out of this, funds of Rs.66 Lakh in two installments have already been released to SSA.

SSA has submitted utilization certificate (UC) for Rs. 65.95 lakh against the released fund of Rs. 66 Lakh.

b. Maintenance of toilets constructed under Swachh Vidyalaya Abhiyan

As per the directives of the Ministry of Power a mechanism was evolved for maintenance of toilets in the schools and it was decided to provide a lump sum maximum amount of Rs. 5000 per toilet per FY which can be released by respective project to the school for maintenance of toilet (for general maintenance like repair/ change of cistern, sheet, tap, wash basin, doors, water tanks, other sanitary fitting, white washing, painting etc.) on receipt of duly verified copies of vouchers by Principal of the school.

In respect of this maintenance scheme, as many as 86 toilets in 44 schools have been provided the maintenance funds of Rs. 3,11,472 during FY 2017-18.

- 26 water bodies have been/ are being rehabilitated/ restored in Himachal Pradesh and Uttarakhand.
- 2421 toilets constructed in Government schools in Himachal Pradesh, Uttarakhand, Bihar and Arunachal Pradesh under the Government of India's initiative of Swachh Bharat Mission.

Biodiversity Park at Vigyan Dham

SJVN Foundation is providing financial assistance to Uttarakhand State Council for Science and Technology (UCOST), Dehradun for setting up of a Biodiversity Park at Vigyan Dham, Dehradun. The total financial implication of the project is Rs. 49,65,140. The park development works include surface dressing of area, construction of drainage system, horticulture & landscaping, Irrigation system, construction of pond with fountain and lighting system, construction of greenhouse etc.

The Biodiversity Park is now providing an ideal opportunity for students to enrich their knowledge in bio-diversity such as herbal garden, medicinal plants, rare and endangered species, etc. The garden is also providing ecological service in term of recharging ground water, protection of land from erosion, tracking of dust, sequestering carbon dioxide and assimilating pollutants besides serving as a habitat for plants and animal species.



Construction of Individual Household latrines (IHHLs) under Open Defection Free (ODF) programme

SJVN is committed to the promotion of Open Defecation Free mission of the Government of India. In reference to the directions of Ministry of Power regarding financial support under Swachh Bharat Mission for construction of Individual House Hold Latrines (IHHLs) in district Ludhiana in Punjab under Open Defecation Free (ODF) program in association with Bharti Foundation, Punjab State, Mission Director, SBM in Ministry of Urban Development (MoUD), GoI and Ministry of Power, an additional budget of Rs. 8.52 crore, subject to adjustment with unspent CSR budget 2016-17 for construction of the 17,049 toilets (@ Rs. 20,000/- per unit) was recommended by 17th COD which was further approved in 249th BOD meeting.

Bharti Foundation conveyed in January 2017 that as per the list conveyed by Punjab Municipal Infrastructural

- 1100 solar street lights and 50 high mast lights are being installed at a cost of Rs. 82,50,109/- in Lucknow (East) through EESL.
- 25 high mast lights and 325 solar street lights are being installed at a cost of Rs. 97,35,355/- in Deoria and Sahjanpur area through EESL.
- Construction of 6 toilets (4 boys and 2 girls) in Saraswati Vidya Mandir, Naitwar under Swachh Bharat mission is under consideration.
- Installation of 5,750 LED street lights and 23,000 dustbins in Himachal Pradesh, at a cost of Rs. 23.01 crore through EESL is underway.

Development Corporation (PMIDC), only 485 toilets were required to be constructed. Further, Bharti Foundation conveyed that the list forwarded by PMIDC was surveyed by them and it has been found that toilets are required only in 227 households. In addition, the status of 49 households is yet to be verified as the same were either locked or couldn't be traced.

Further Bharti Foundation through email dated 02/08/2017 conveyed that only 201 IHHLs have been constructed and also informed that they have received the share from Govt. of Punjab and Govt. of India by Bharti Foundation and requested SJVN for release of respective share. As per the MoU and communication of Ms Bharti Foundation, SJVN have released an amount of Rs. 10,05,000 (for construction of 201 toilets) on 05.09.2017. In the said communication, M/s Bharti Foundation has also conveyed that the MoU may be treated as complete.

Installation of LED based Solar Lighting in Uttar Pradesh

A MoU was signed with EESL for Rs. 71,74,008 plus applicable service taxes for installation of LED based 100 solar street lights and 50 high mast lights in Lucknow (East). As per MoU, 1st Instalment of Rs. 7,17,400 was released to EESL in March 2017.

Further a committee was also constituted by SJVN for site inspection of the high mast lights installed in Lucknow (East) by EESL. The committee visited Lucknow on 09.02.2018 and has submitted its report. EESL has

informed that 96 solar street lights have already been installed in Lucknow.

CSR and Sustainability project for implementation and installations of LED based solar public lighting (High Mast) & Solar street lights in U.P.

SJVN Foundation had approved installation of LED



based 25 high mast lights and 325 solar street lights at a cost of Rs. 97,35,355 in Deoria and Sahjanpur area through EESL.

Accordingly, an MoU was signed with EESL for installation of these lights at a cost of Rs. 97,35,355 in Deoria and Sahjanpur area (Rs. 84,65,526 plus applicable service taxes). As per the MOU, 1st Instalment of Rs.8,46,552 was released to EESL in March 2017. Now EESL have informed that 25 LED high mast lights and 200 solar street lights have been installed in Shahjahanpur while the status of solar street lights installed in Deoria has not been provided by EESL.



Construction of toilets in Saraswati Vidya Mandir, Naitwar

Sarawati Vidya Mandir, Naitwar is a boarding school for class 6th to 8th and located in village Gainchwan Gaon which is a project affected village of NMHEP. The school is being run by Vidya Bharti Akhil Bhartiya Shikshan Sansthan and has strength of 140 students. Presently there are only two toilet blocks (1 for boys and 1 for

girls) available in Saraswati Vidya Mandir, Naitwar and are not properly functional. A request was received from Saraswati Vidya Mandir and Uttranchal Devi Apda Pirit Sahayata Samiti, Naitwar for providing 6 more toilets in the school.

In view of the request, Naitwar Mori & Jhakol Sankri HEPs have proposed to construct 6 toilets (4 boys and 2 girls) in Saraswati Vidya Mandir, Naitwar under Swachh Bharat mission through VDAC Gainchwan Gaon. The project has estimated the expenditure of construction of toilets under Swachh Vidyalaya Abhiyan, at Rs. 7.5 Lakh. The Trust has accorded in principle approval for construction of toilets.



Installation of LED based Solar street lights and Dustbins in Himachal Pradesh

A proposal was received from EESL for providing solar street lights and dustbins at various locations in Himachal Pradesh at the behest of Ministry of Power. The project is proposed to be executed out of CSR funds

of the power sector PSUs. Accordingly EESL has prepared and submitted the proposal in line with the list of activities provided to them by MOP for the below mentioned project:

1. Supply, Installation, Commissioning with 05 Years Warrantee & Maintenance of 5,750 LED based Solar Street Lights (18W).
2. Design, Supply, Installation, Commissioning with 01 Year Warrantee of 23,000 Sets of Dustbins (110 Ltr capacity each).

Further EESL has also sought consent of SJVN for installation of the LED light of 12W (5175 no) and 7W (575 no.) instead of 18 W (5750 no) which has reduced the total cost to 23,03,97,831/- plus applicable taxes.



On a request received from EESL 40% payment (Rs. 9.13 crore.) of total project cost has been released to EESL.

EESL has also requested SJVN to supply & install 12W LED light in place of 7W lights because the price discovered after floating tenders of 12W lights is less than that of 7W lights. The same has also been approved in 25th Foundation meeting.

SJVN is thus continuously striving for environmentally sustainable CSR interventions for making this planet a happy and green place to live.

4.5 Preservation and Promotion of local Culture and sports

With a view to promote the composite culture of India, SJVN has long been extending financial support for the preservation of local culture through promotion of national and local festivals like International Lavi Mela at Rampur, Summer Festival at Shimla, Dussehra festival at Kullu, Hamir Utsav at Hamirpur, Kinnaur Mahotsav at Kinnaur etc.

During this year an amount of Rs. 53.07 lakh has been spent towards the promotion of local culture and sports.

Promotion and excellence of sports

SJVN had been requested by the Department of Sports, Government of India, Ministry of Youth Affairs & Sports, and Sports Authority of India for contribution to National Sports Development Fund (NSDF) supporting the sports activities.

Accordingly financial support of Rs. 10 Lakh has been released to NSDF for promoting sports activities.



Development, renovation and reconstruction of Bhimakali and Tara Mata temple complexes

Besides undertaking cleanliness drives in iconic places, SJVN has also extended financial support for renovation, construction and repair of Bhimakali Temple complex at Sarahan and Tara Mata temple complex at Shimla for protection and the preservation of its rich cultural heritage.



SJVN was requested by the government of Himachal Pradesh for providing financial support of Rs. 1 crore for construction of boundary wall and for repair and reconstruction of parts of Bhimakali Temple complex at Sarahan as a measure to ensure environmental cleanliness in its premises and also for protection and the preservation of its rich cultural heritage.



The company was further requested for financial support of Rs. 2 crore for ongoing renovation/reconstruction of the Tara Mata Temple complex, near Shimla. The renovation/ reconstruction of these two premises are being undertaken exclusively as per the Pahari architecture in wooden style. The renovation/up gradation work of Tara Devi is nearing to completion and renovation/up gradation work at Bhimakali temple is yet to be started.

- Financial support of Rs. 3 crore provided for renovation/reconstruction of Tara Mata Temple complex, near Shimla & Bhimakali Temple complex at Sarahan as a measure to ensure environmental cleanliness in its premises and also for protection and the preservation of its rich cultural heritage. The renovation/ reconstruction of these two premises are being undertaken in Pahari architecture.
 - Rs. 53.07 lakh spent towards promotion of local culture and sports.
 - Financial support of Rs. 10 Lakh has been released to NSDF.

4.6 Assistance during natural disasters

In order to mitigate the sufferings of victims of natural calamities and effects of natural disasters, SJVN has long been providing timely assistance during such calamities like earthquakes, floods, draughts forest fire, etc. The support is extended by providing relief material, infrastructural support directly to the victims or through providing financial support to the Chief Minister's relief funds.

Contribution towards Relief Fund

On a request received through Buxar Thermal Power Project for financial contribution towards CM's Relief fund, Bihar and for procurement of relief material as the state was facing acute flood situation affecting almost 16 districts, SJVN Foundation promptly responded and agreed to provide a financial support of Rs. 46,38,900 towards flood relief at Bihar from CSR and Sustainability Budget FY 2017-18 as per details below:

- Contribution of Rs. 25 Lakh towards Bihar Chief Minister's Relief Fund, - The cheque was handed over to Hon'ble Chief Minister of Bihar on 13/09/2017.
- Rs. 21,38,900 to BTTP for procurement and transportation of relief material for the flood relief- Material dispatched to flood victims on 14/09/2017.

In addition to the above, during the year 2017, Himachal Pradesh also encountered various natural disasters like landslides, heavy rain fall and ongoing drought etc. Accordingly, an amount of Rs. 1 crore was contributed towards Himachal Pradesh Chief Minister's Relief Fund.



In order to mitigate the sufferings of victims of natural calamities and effects of natural disasters, SJVN has long been providing timely assistance during such calamities like earthquakes, floods, draughts forest fire, etc. The support is extended by providing relief material, infrastructural support directly to the victims or through providing financial support to the relief funds. SJVN has thus never lagged behind in coming to the aid of people in natural disasters.

SJVN stall was formally inaugurated by Ms Seema Bahuguna, Secretary DPE on 5th May, 2017. Among the dignitaries who visited the stall were Shri Babul Supriyo, Honble Minister of State for Heavy Industries and Public Enterprises, Government of India who greatly appreciated the CSR activities being undertaken by the Company. Additional Secretary, DPE Shri Madhukar Gupta also visited the stall and appreciated the display. The display at SJVN stall was a centre of attraction as various dignitaries like P. Gopichand, coach of National

Badminton team, Sh. U.D. Chobey, Director General, SCOPE, R. Mehrotra, CMD, RITES, K. Sharan, Chairman & CEO Greentech Foundation, Sh. D R Sarin, CMD, ALIMCO also visited SJVN stall.

It was for the first time that the DPE had organized the CSR fair in the country. The focus of SJVN stall was on empowerment of youth and women by way of a number of CSR initiatives being undertaken in all the five states of the company's operation. Through the six verticals of CSR viz Health & Hygiene, Education & Skill Development, Sustainable Development, Infrastructure & Community Development, etc. the notable achievements were showcased. It also projected the presence of SJVN in five states and three countries and

For the financial year 2017-18 SJVN Foundation had provided a CSR budget of Rs. 37.50 crore. With marginally higher allocation, the Foundation could afford to perform better in meeting aspirations of the stakeholders at large.

In the field of health and hygiene it was satisfying that about 1.5 lakh treatments were provided to the beneficiaries spread in four states of the country namely Himachal Pradesh, Uttarakhand, Bihar and Maharashtra through the company's 14 Mobile Medical Units named Satluj Sanjeevani Seva.

In addition to the MMUs being operated by the company, SJVN has also funded a MMU for Dr. Hedgewar Samarak Samiti at a cost of about Rs. 28 lakh during the year. SJVN's efforts thus complement the mandate of National Rural Health Mission of India towards improving the lagging health indicators among rural and out reached people. In addition to the health services being rendered through the mobile medical units, every year the company has long been organizing as many as 40 health camps for the benefit of people in the vicinity of its operations. These specialized health camps have also proved a boon to the out reached people of the society.

During the year more than 13,000 patients were treated for various ailments in these camps. Here again it was a matter of solace that the women patients outnumbered men. During the past five years as many as 185 health camps have been organized in the four states of company's operations where more than 56,000 patients have been treated.

As another initiative taken in the area of health and hygiene during the year SJVN has started organizing Ayurvedic health awareness programs in Himachal Pradesh. During the year, 30 such camps were organized benefitting 3406 patients.

The company also found that physiotherapy facilities, specially required for age related and accident related problems, were not available in vicinity of Rampur HEP. SJVN thus rose to the occasion and set up a physiotherapy centre at its Rampur Project Hospital during the year.

In addition to such activities being organised on a regular basis, recently SJVN has also agreed to provide financial support for the construction of one floor of the Rotary Ashray, a lodging facility for the attendants of cancer patients at Indira Gandhi Medical College & Hospital. The facility is in addition to a number of wheel chairs and patient's trolleys given to the hospital in the past.

When it comes to empowering the youth, during the year focus of SJVN continued on benefiting the youth with a host of Skill upgradation and training programs.

Apart from this, as many as 92 training programs were organized in the field of cutting & sewing, mobile repair, BPO, beautician, toy making etc. benefitting 2870 participants during the year.

When it comes to promoting education, under the company's ongoing Silver jubilee Merit Scholarship Scheme, since 2012 SJVN has already provided scholarships to as many as 1137 meritorious students.



In addition to the Silver Jubilee Merit Scholarship Scheme, the company is also operating a reward scheme for topper students of the Government schools.

Over the years SJVN has built and shaped thousands of infrastructures like school, buildings, hospitals, bus stands, mahila mandals, panchayat bhawans, public toilets, school toilets, link roads, public parks,

playgrounds etc. In this area, as many as 109 community assets were taken up for construction in the project areas.

For the year 2018-19, SJVN Foundation has been provided a budget of Rs. 34.85 Crore for undertaking various ongoing and new initiatives. It is already in the process of excelling its goals and targets for the year.
